Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Education
Springville Community School District

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, business type activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Springville Community School District, Springville, Iowa, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of District officials. My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinions.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Springville Community School District as of June 30, 2009, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, for the year then ended in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, I have also issued my report dated March 29, 2010 on my consideration of Springville Community School District's internal control over financial reporting and my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of my audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 13 and 41 through 42 are not required parts of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. I have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. I did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Springville Community School District's basic financial statements. Other supplementary information included in Schedules 1 through 6, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in my audit of the basic financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole. I previously audited, in accordance with the standards referred to in the second paragraph of this report, the financial statements for the five years ended June 30, 2008 (which are not presented herein) and expressed unqualified opinions on those financial statements. In my opinion, the information set forth in the supplementary information for each of the six years in the period ended June 30, 2009, appearing in Schedule 7, is fairly stated, in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements from which it has been derived.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Springville Community School District provides this Management's Discussion and Analysis of its financial statements. This narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities is for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. We encourage readers to consider this information in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which follow.

2009 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- General Fund revenues increased from \$4,147,958 in fiscal 2008 to \$4,159,821 in fiscal 2009, and General Fund expenditures decreased from \$4,115,847 in fiscal 2008 to \$4,025,921 in fiscal 2009. The District's General Fund balance increased from \$494,208 in fiscal 2008 to \$628,108 in fiscal 2009, a 27% increase.
- The increase in General Fund revenue was attributable to an increase in property tax revenues. The decrease in expenditures was due primarily to reduction in administrative and instructional staff. One reason the General Fund balance increased is because of the district's efforts to decrease expenditures for fiscal 2009. As a result, the District was able to increase its cash balance by \$179,825.
- A decrease in interest rates during the past fiscal year resulted in interest earnings in the General Fund alone decreasing from \$21,906 in fiscal 2008 to \$11,371 in fiscal 2009.
- The district was able to grow its unspent authorized budget \$213,010 from fiscal 2008 to fiscal 2009.
- The district received a 1.5% budget cut in fiscal year 2009 resulting in \$29,400 less revenue from the state.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The annual report consists of a series of financial statements and other information, as follows:

Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the District's financial activities.

The Government-wide Financial Statements consist of a Statement of Net Assets and a Statement of Activities. These provide information about the activities of Springville Community School District as a whole and present an overall view of the District's finances.

The Fund Financial Statements tell how governmental services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements report Springville Community School District's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the most significant funds.

Notes to financial statements provide additional information essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.

Required Supplementary Information further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the District's budget for the year.

Other Supplementary Information provides detailed information about the nonmajor Governmental and Enterprise Funds.

Figure A-1 shows how the various parts of this annual report are arranged and relate to one another.




Figure A-2 summarizes the major features of the District's financial statements, including the portion of the District's activities they cover and the types of information they contain.

REPORTING THE DISTRICT'S FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements report information about the District as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the District's assets and liabilities. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities, regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two government-wide financial statements report the District's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets – the difference between the District's assets and liabilities – are one way to measure the District's financial health or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net assets are an indicator

of whether financial position is improving or deteriorating. To assess the District's overall health, additional non-financial factors, such as changes in the District's property tax base and the condition of school buildings and other facilities, need to be considered.

In the government-wide financial statements, the District's activities are divided into two categories:

- *Governmental activities:* Most of the District's basic services are included here, such as regular and special education, transportation and administration. Property tax and state aid finance most of these activities.
- *Business type activities:* The District charges fees to help cover the costs of certain services it provides. The District's school nutrition program and preschool programs are included here.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's funds, focusing on its most significant or "major" funds – not the District as a whole. Funds are accounting devices the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs.

Some funds are required by state law and by bond covenants. The District establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes, such as accounting for student activity funds, or to show that it is properly using certain revenues, such as federal grants.

The District has two kinds of funds:

- 1) *Governmental funds:* Most of the District's basic services are included in governmental funds, which generally focus on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs.

The District's governmental funds include the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Fund and Debt Service Fund.

The required financial statements for governmental funds include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances.

- 2) *Proprietary funds:* Services for which the District charges a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way as the government-wide financial statements. The District's enterprise funds, one type of proprietary fund, are the same as its business type activities, but provide more detail and additional information, such as cash flows. The District currently has two enterprise funds, the School Nutrition Fund and Preschool Fund.

The required financial statements for proprietary funds include a statement of net assets, a statement of revenues, expenses and changes in fund net assets and a statement of cash flows.

Reconciliations between the government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements follow the fund financial statements.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The District's combined net assets increased by approximately 41%, or \$685,589, from the prior year. The largest portion of the District's net assets is the invested in capital assets (e.g., land, infrastructure, buildings and equipment), less the related debt. The debt related to the investment in capital assets is liquidated with sources other than capital assets.

Restricted net assets represent resources that are subject to external restrictions, constitutional provisions or enabling legislation on how they can be used. The District's restricted net assets increased \$221,664, or approximately 41% over the prior year.

Unrestricted net assets – the part of net assets that can be used to finance day-to-day operations without constraints established by debt covenants, enabling legislation or other legal requirements – increased \$309,801, or approximately 105%.

In fiscal 2009, property tax and unrestricted state grants account for 68% of the revenue from governmental activities while charges for service and sales and operating grants and contributions account for almost 100% of the revenue from business type activities.

The District's total revenues were \$5,393,069 of which \$5,188,489 was for governmental activities and \$204,580 was for business type activities.

As shown in Figure A-4, the District as a whole experienced a 1% increase in revenues and a 2% increase in expenses. Property tax increased \$198,583 and the district received statewide sales and service tax revenues to fund increases in expenditures. The majority of increased expenses related to increases in salaries and benefits, textbooks, and increases in expenses funded by grants received by the District.

Governmental Activities

Revenues for governmental activities were \$5,188,489 and expenses were \$4,507,874 for the year ended June 30, 2009. The District was able to balance the budget by reducing expenses by reducing staff and operational expenses, thereby, increasing the District’s cash balance.

The following table presents the total and net cost of the District’s major governmental activities: instruction, support services, non-instructional programs and other expenses, for the year ended June 30, 2009.

For the year ended June 30, 2009:

- The cost financed by users of the District’s programs was \$514,303.
- Federal and state governments subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions totaling \$686,300.
- The net cost of governmental activities was financed with \$2,167,858 in property and other taxes and \$1,791,288 in unrestricted state grants.

Business Type Activities

Revenues for business type activities for the year ended June 30, 2009 were \$204,580 representing 6% increase over the prior year and expenses totaled \$199,606, a 5% decrease from the prior year. The District’s business type activities include the School Nutrition Fund and Preschool Fund. Revenues of these activities were comprised of charges for services, tuition, federal and state reimbursements and investment income.

The increase in revenue is due to the increase in enrollment in the District’s Preschool Program during the fiscal year 2009. The increase in expenses is due to salaries and benefits. In the School Nutrition Program for the 2008/2009 school year the decrease in expenditures is attributable to reduction in staff, salaries and benefits, supply purchases, and in food purchases.

INDIVIDUAL FUND ANALYSIS

As previously noted, Springville Community School District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

The financial performance of the District as a whole is reflected in its governmental funds, as well. As the District completed the year, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$4,983,179, well above last year's ending fund balances of \$1,053,160. The primary reason for the increase of \$3,930,019 in combined fund balances in fiscal 2009 is due to an increase in tax growth due to increased valuations and revenue from sales tax revenue bonds.

Governmental Fund Highlights

- The District's improving General Fund financial position is the result of many factors. Growth during the year in property tax valuations and increase in property tax levies resulted in an increase in revenues. The District was also able to keep expenditures in check, thereby, increasing its overall financial balance.
- The General Fund balance increased from \$494,208 to \$628,108, due in part to the increase in the District tax base, the reduction of expenditures, and the reduction in staff.
- The Capital Projects Fund balance increased from \$448,753 to \$4,201,693 due to sale of revenue bonds in 2009.

Proprietary Fund Highlights

Enterprise Fund net assets increased from \$(6,393) at June 30, 2008 to \$(1,419) at June 30, 2009, representing an increase of approximately 78%. The increase in net assets is due to the operating revenue, increase in federal revenue sources, and a decrease in operating expenses.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

The District did not amend its annual budget during the year ended June 30, 2009.

The District's revenues were \$387,023 less than budgeted revenues, a variance of 7%. The most significant variance resulted from the District receiving less revenue than budgeted from State Foundation Aid, income surtax, interest income, State and Federal sources, and revenue from local sources.

Total expenditures were \$1,151,534 less than budgeted, due primarily to the District's budget for the General Fund. It is the District's practice to budget expenditures at near the maximum authorized spending authority for the General Fund. The District then manages or controls General Fund spending through its line-item budget. As a result, the District's certified budget should always exceed actual expenditures for the year.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At June 30, 2009, the District had invested \$1,244,430, net of accumulated depreciation, in a broad range of capital assets, including land, buildings, athletic facilities, computers, audio-visual equipment and transportation equipment. (See Figure A-6) This represents a net increase of approximately 9% from last year. More detailed information about the District's capital assets is presented in Note 6 to the financial statements. Depreciation expense for the year was \$95,832.

The original cost of the District's capital assets was \$4,680,914. Governmental funds account for \$4,633,208, with the remainder of \$47,706 accounted for in the Proprietary, School Nutrition Fund.

The largest change was in the land category, which increased from \$215,023 at June 30, 2008 to \$332,167 at June 30, 2009 due to the purchase of land during fiscal year 2009.

Long-Term Debt

At June 30, 2009, the District had \$4,002,416 in general obligation and other long-term debt outstanding. This represents an increase of approximately 567% from last year. (See Figure A-7) Additional information about the District's long-term debt is presented in Note 7 to the financial statements.

The District continues to carry a general obligation bond rating of "A-" assigned by national rating agencies to the District's debt. The Constitution of the State of Iowa limits the amount of general obligation debt districts can issue to 5 percent of the assessed value of all taxable property within the District. The District's outstanding general obligation debt is significantly below its constitutional debt limit of approximately \$7.851 million.

In June 2009 the District issued \$3,585,000 of Statewide Sales and Services Tax revenue bonds for financing upgrades to the HVAC systems at the buildings.

ECONOMIC FACTORS BEARING ON THE DISTRICT'S FUTURE

At the time these financial statements were prepared and audited, the District was aware of several existing circumstances that could significantly affect its financial health in the future:

- Fiscal 2009 was the first year of a two-year contract with the Springville Education Teacher Association (SETA). The District will negotiate a new agreement during fiscal 2009. The Master Contract language is negotiated every 2 years, however salaries and benefits are negotiated annually. Settlements in excess of "new money" or allowable growth in state funding could have an adverse effect on the District's General Fund budget and related fund balance.
- The District's certified enrollment on October 1, 2009 was down 14.2 students. In response to this the district is taking the steps necessary to be prepared for the negative impact on the district financially in the 2010/11 school year. There is potential for growth and the district is hopeful that this decline enrollment is only temporary.
- The District is also taking measures to protect the General Fund budget with the 2010/11 reduction in allowable growth funding and future State/Federal budget cuts by administering staff reductions as well as exploring sharing incentives with other school districts.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Springville Community School District is a political subdivision of the State of Iowa and operates public schools for children in grades kindergarten through twelve. The geographic area served includes the City of Springville, Iowa, and the agricultural territory in Linn County. The District is governed by a Board of Education whose members are elected on a non-partisan basis.

The District's financial statements are prepared in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

A. Reporting Entity

For financial reporting purposes, Springville Community School District has included all funds, organizations, agencies, boards, commissions, and authorities. The District has also considered all potential component units for which it is financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the District are such that exclusion would cause the District's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability. These criteria include appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body, and (1) the ability of the District to impose its will on that organization or (2) the potential for the organization to provide specific benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on, the District. The Springville Community School District has no component units which meet the Governmental Accounting Standards Board criteria.

Jointly Governed Organizations - The District participates in a jointly governed organization that provides services to the District but does not meet the criteria of a joint venture since there is no ongoing financial interest or responsibility by the participating governments. The District is a member of the County Assessor's Conference Board.

B. Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements - The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities report information on all of the activities of the District. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by tax and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for service.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Net assets are reported in three categories:

Invested in capital assets, net of related debt consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by outstanding balances for bonds, notes, and other debt that are attributed to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Restricted net assets result when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted net assets consist of net assets not meeting the definition of the two preceding categories. Unrestricted net assets often have constraints on resources imposed by management which can be removed or modified.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function and 2) grants, contributions and interest restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function. Property tax and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements - Separate financial statements are provided for governmental and proprietary funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as other nonmajor governmental funds.

The District reports the following major governmental fund:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District. All general tax revenues and other revenues that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, including instructional, support and other costs.

The Capital Projects Fund is used to account for all resources used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities.

The District reports no major proprietary funds. However, it reports two non-major enterprise funds, the School Nutrition Fund and Preschool Fund, which are used to account for the school nutrition and preschool operations, respectively of the district.

C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property tax is recognized as revenue in the year for which it is

levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days after year end.

Property tax, intergovernmental revenues (shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments) and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the District.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, principal and interest on long-term debt, claims and judgments and termination benefits are recognized as expenditures only when payment is due. Capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Under the terms of grant agreements, the District funds certain programs by a combination of specific cost-reimbursement grants and general revenues. Thus, when program expenses are incurred, there are both restricted and unrestricted net assets available to finance the program. It is the District's policy to first apply cost-reimbursement grant resources to such programs, and then general revenues.

The proprietary funds of the District apply all applicable GASB pronouncements, as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless these pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedure.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from non-operating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the District's enterprise funds are charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for enterprise funds include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

The District maintains its financial records on the cash basis. The financial statements of the District are prepared by making memorandum adjusting entries to the cash basis financial records.

D. Assets, Liabilities and Fund Equity

The following accounting policies are followed in preparing the financial statements:

Cash, Pooled Investments and Cash Equivalents - The cash balances of most District funds are pooled and invested. Investments are stated at fair value, except for the investment in the Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust, which is valued at amortized cost and non-negotiable certificates of deposit which are stated at cost.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, all short-term cash investments that are highly liquid are considered to be cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, and at the day of purchase, they have a maturity date no longer than twelve months.

Property Tax Receivable - Property tax in governmental funds is accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Property tax receivable is recognized in these funds on the levy or lien date, which is the date that the tax asking is certified by the Board of Education. Delinquent property tax receivable represents unpaid taxes for the current year and prior years. The succeeding year property tax receivable represents taxes certified by the Board of Education to be collected in the next fiscal year for the purposes set out in the budget for the next fiscal year. By statute, the District is required to certify its budget in April of each year for the subsequent fiscal year. However, by statute, the tax asking and budget certification for the following fiscal year becomes effective on the first day of that year. Although the succeeding property tax receivable has been recorded, the related revenue is deferred in both the government-wide and fund financial statements and will not be recognized as revenue until the year for which it is levied.

Property tax revenue recognized in these funds become due and collectible in September and March of the fiscal year with a 1½ % per month penalty for delinquent payments; is based on January 1, 2007 assessed property valuations; is for the tax accrual period July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009 and reflects the tax asking contained in the budget certified to the County Board of Supervisors in April 2008.

Due From Other Governments - Due from other governments represents amounts due from the State of Iowa, various shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments.

Inventories - Inventories are valued at cost using the first-in, first-out method for purchased items and government commodities. Inventories of proprietary funds are recorded as expenses when consumed rather than when purchased or received.

Capital Assets - Capital assets, which include property, furniture and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental or business type activities columns in the government-wide Statement of Net Assets. Capital assets are recorded at historical cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend asset lives

are not capitalized. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost in excess of the following thresholds and estimated useful lives in excess of two years.

Salaries and Benefits Payable - Payroll and related expenditures for teachers with annual contracts corresponding to the current school year, which are payable in July and August, have been accrued as liabilities.

Termination Benefits - District employees meeting certain requirements are eligible for early retirement benefits. A liability is recorded when incurred in the government-wide financial statements. A liability for these amounts is reported in the governmental fund financial statements only for employees that have resigned or retired. The early retirement liability has been computed based on rates of pay in effect at June 30, 2009. The early retirement liability attributable to the governmental activities will be paid primarily from the Management Fund.

Deferred Revenue - Although certain revenues are measurable, they are not available. Available means collected within the current period or expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Deferred revenue in the governmental fund financial statements represents the amount of assets that have been recognized, but the related revenue has not been recognized since the assets are not collected within the current period or expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Deferred revenue consists of unspent federal grant proceeds, as well as property tax and income surtax receivables not collected within sixty days after year end and amounts paid by students for meals not yet served.

Deferred revenue on the Statement of Net Assets consists of succeeding year property tax receivable that will not be recognized as revenue until the year for which it is levied and amounts paid by students for meals not yet served.

Long-term Liabilities - In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the governmental activities column in the Statement of Net Assets.

Fund Balance - In the governmental fund financial statements, reservations of fund balance are reported for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose.

Net Assets - Invested in capital assets, net of related debt consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balance of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Restricted net assets consist of net assets with constraints placed on the use either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or laws and regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. The government-wide statement of net assets reports \$65,513 of net assets, which are restricted by enabling legislation.

E. Budgeting and Budgetary Accounting

The budgetary comparison and related disclosures are reported as Required Supplementary Information.

Note 2. Cash and Pooled Investments

The District's deposits in banks at June 30, 2009 were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by the State Sinking Fund in accordance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa. This chapter provides for additional assessments against the depositories to insure there will be no loss of public funds.

The District is authorized by statute to invest public funds in obligations of the United States government, its agencies and instrumentalities; certificates of deposit or other evidences of deposit at federally insured depository institutions approved by the Board of Education; prime eligible bankers acceptances; certain high rated commercial paper; perfected repurchase agreements; certain registered open-end management investment companies; certain joint investment trusts; and warrants or improvement certificates of a drainage district.

At June 30, 2009, the District had investments in the Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust, as follows:

Credit Risk. The investments in the Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust were rated Aaa by Moody's Investors Service.

The Debt Service Fund and Preschool Fund had outstanding warrants issued in excess of the funds' portions of shared bank accounts. Therefore, the negative cash balances are reported as interfund receivables/payables. The School Nutrition Fund owed General Fund for salaries and benefits paid by General Fund and not reimbursed by School Nutrition Fund at June 30, 2009. These interfund receivables/payables are expected to be repaid during the year ending June 30, 2010.

Transfers generally move revenues from the fund statutorily required to collect the resources to the fund statutorily required to expend the resources. These transfers were to move funds from the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy Fund to the Debt Service Fund for payment of principal and interest on debt and from the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy Fund to the Capital Projects Fund to correct miscoding of an expenditure.

Note 5. Iowa Schools Cash Anticipation Program (ISCAP)

The District participates in the Iowa Schools Cash Anticipation Program (ISCAP). ISCAP is a program of the Iowa Association of School Boards and is designed to provide funds to participating entities during periods of cash deficits. ISCAP is funded by a semiannual issuance of anticipatory warrants, which mature as noted below. The warrant sizing of each school corporation is based on a projection of cash flow needs during the semiannual period. ISCAP accounts are maintained for each participating entity, and monthly statements are provided regarding their cash balance, interest earnings, and amounts available for withdrawal for each

outstanding series of warrants. Bankers Trust Co. NA is the trustee for the program. A summary of the District's participation in ISCAP as of June 30, 2009, is as follows:

The District pledges its state foundation aid payments and General Fund receipts as security for warrants issued. Repayments must be made when General Fund receipts are received. If a balance is outstanding on the last date the funds are available to be drawn, then the District must repay the outstanding withdrawal from its General Fund receipts. In addition, the District must make minimum warrant repayments on the 25th of each month immediately following the final date that the warrant proceeds may be used in an amount equal to 25% of the warrant amount. There was no ISCAP advance activity for the year ended June 30, 2009.

Interest costs incurred and charged to expense on all long-term debt was \$73,069 for the year ended June 30, 2009. During the year ended June 30, 2009, the District made principal payments on total long-term debt of \$180,000.

Refunded General Obligation Bonds

On April 1, 2004, the District issued \$740,000 of general obligation refunding bonds. These bonds were used to refund the District’s general obligation bonds dated February 1, 1996. The 1996 general obligation bonds were called for redemption as of June 1, 2004 and were all retired as of June 30, 2004. The District has pledged future statewide sales and services tax revenues to repay the \$3,585,000 of bonds issued in June 2009. The bonds were issued to finance upgrades to the HVAC system at the buildings. The bonds are payable solely from the proceeds of the statewide sales and services tax revenues received by the District and are payable through 2030. The bonds are not a general obligation of the District. However, the debt is subject to the constitutional debt limitation of the District. Annual principal and interest payments on the bonds are expected to require approximately 80% of the statewide sales and services tax revenues. The total principal and interest remaining to be paid on the bonds is \$3,585,000. For the current year, no principal and interest was paid on the bonds and statewide sales and services tax revenues was \$408,427.

The resolution providing for the issuance of the statewide sales and services tax revenue bonds includes the following provisions:

- a) \$327,257 of the proceeds from the issuance of the revenue bonds shall be deposited to a reserve account to be used solely for the purpose of paying principal and interest on the bonds if insufficient money is available in the sinking account. The balance of the proceeds shall be deposited to the project account.
- b) All proceeds from the statewide sales and services tax shall be placed in a revenue account.
- c) Monies in the revenue account shall be disbursed to make deposits into a sinking account to pay the principal and interest requirements of the revenue bonds for the fiscal year.
- d) Any monies remaining in the revenue account after the required transfer to the sinking account may be transferred to the project account to be used for any lawful purpose.

The District complied with all the revenue bond provisions during the year ended June 30, 2009.

Capital Loan Notes

On June 18, 2004, the District issued capital loan notes in the amounts of \$550,000. Proceeds of the notes were used for improvements to the heating and cooling system at the elementary building. The capital loan notes are scheduled to be repaid as follows:

Termination Benefits

The District offers a voluntary early retirement plan to its certified employees. Eligible employees are required to be at least 55 years of age and have completed 15 years of consecutive service to the District. Employees must have completed an application, which is required to be approved by the Board of Education. The early retirement incentive for each eligible employee is equal to one-half of the employee's salary for the year in which he/she applies to participate in the early retirement plan. The retiree receives the early retirement benefits in three equal payments with the first payment being made on or before July 2 in the calendar year in which the employee is approved for early retirement. The retiree may elect to leave their benefit in the Management Fund to be used to pay the retiree's medical insurance until the benefit is completely used.

At June 30, 2009, the District had obligations to three participants with a total liability of \$47,416. Actual early retirement expenditures for the year ended June 30, 2009 totaled \$24,002.

Note 8. Pension and Retirement Benefits

The District contributes to the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Iowa. IPERS provides retirement and death benefits which are established by State statute to plan members and beneficiaries. IPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to IPERS, P.O. Box 9117, Des Moines, IA, 50306-9117.

Plan members were required to contribute 4.10% of their annual covered salary and the District was required to contribute 6.35% of annual covered payroll for the year ended June 30, 2009. Plan members were required to contribute 3.90% and 3.70% of their annual covered salary and the District was required to contribute 6.05% and 5.75% of annual covered payroll for the years ended June 30, 2008 and 2007, respectively. Contribution requirements are established by State statute. The District's contribution to IPERS for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 were \$138,604, \$133,688 and \$121,968, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

Note 9. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft; damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by the purchase of commercial insurance. The District assumes liability for any deductibles and claims in excess of coverage limitations. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Note 10. Area Education Agency

The District is required by the Code of Iowa to budget for its share of special education support, media, and educational services provided through the area education agency. The District's actual amount for this purpose totaled \$164,655 adjusting entry to the cash basis financial statements.

Note 11. Deficit Balances

The District had an unreserved, undesignated fund deficit in the Debt Service Fund of \$27,100 and a net assets deficit in the Preschool Fund of \$22,123 at June 30, 2009. Total enterprise funds had an unrestricted net assets deficit of \$13,548 at June 30, 2009.

Note 12. Contingencies

Grant Funding - The District participates in a number of federal and state programs that are fully or partially funded by grants received from other governmental units. Expenditures

financed by grants were subjected to local audit but still remain open to audit by the appropriate grantor government. If expenditures are disallowed by the grantor government due to noncompliance with grant program regulations, the District may be required to reimburse the grantor government. As of June 30, 2009, significant amounts of grant expenditures have not been audited by granting authorities but the District believes that disallowed expenditures, if any, based on subsequent audits will not have a material effect on any of the individual governmental funds or the overall financial position of the District.

Note 13. Special Investigation

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008, Springville Community School District requested the office of the Auditor of State to perform a special investigation of the District as a result of a concern. The Auditor of State's special investigation report is not available as of the date of this audit report. However, when the special investigation report is complete, copies will be available at the District's business office, the County Attorney's Office and the Attorney General's Office. It does not appear that the investigation will result in a material adjustment to the financial statements.

Note 14. Subsequent Event

During the year ended June 30, 2009, the District sold \$3,585,000 of revenue bonds to help finance upgrades to the HVAC systems at the buildings. As of June 30, 2009 the District had not entered into any contracts for the project, which is expected to begin during the summer of 2009 and be completed by the summer of 2010.

For the Year Ended June 30, 2009

This budgetary comparison is presented as Required Supplementary Information in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 41 for governments with significant budgetary perspective differences resulting from not being able to present budgetary comparisons for the General Fund and each major Special Revenue Fund.

In accordance with the Code of Iowa, the Board of Education annually adopts a budget following required public notice and hearing for all funds. The budget may be amended during the year utilizing similar statutorily prescribed procedures. The District's budget is prepared on the GAAP basis. The District did not amend its budget during the year ended June 30, 2009.

Formal and legal budgetary control for the certified budget is based upon four major classes of expenditures known as functions, not by fund. These four functions are instruction, support services, non-instructional programs and other expenditures. Although the budget document presents function expenditures or expenses by fund, the legal level of control is at the aggregated function level, not by fund. The Code of Iowa also provides District expenditures in the General Fund may not exceed the amount authorized by the school finance formula. During the year, the District did not adopt any budget amendments.

However, as discussed below, I identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that I consider to be significant deficiencies, including deficiencies I consider to be material weaknesses.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of the control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects Springville Community School District's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood a misstatement of Springville Community School District's financial

statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by Springville Community School District's internal control. I consider the deficiencies in internal control described in Part I of the accompanying Schedule of Findings to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies that results in more than a remote likelihood a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by Springville Community School District's internal control.

My consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, of the significant deficiencies described above, I believe items A and B are material weaknesses.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Springville Community School District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, I performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of my audit and, accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. The results of my tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards. However, I noted certain immaterial instances of non-compliance or other matters that are described in Part II of the accompanying Schedule of Findings.

Comments involving statutory and other legal matters about the District's operations for the year ended June 30, 2009 are based exclusively on knowledge obtained from procedures performed during my audit of the financial statements of the District. Since my audit was based on tests and samples, not all transactions that might have had an impact on the comments were necessarily audited. The comments involving statutory and other legal matters are not intended to constitute legal interpretations of those statutes.

Springville Community School District's responses to findings identified in my audit are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings. While I have expressed my conclusions on the District's responses, I did not audit Springville Community School District's responses and, accordingly, I express no opinion on them.

This report, a public record by law, is intended solely for the information and use of the officials, employees and citizens of Springville Community School District and other parties to whom Springville Community School District may report, including federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities. This report is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

I would like to acknowledge the many courtesies and assistance extended to me by the personnel of the Springville Community School District during the course of my audit. Part I. Findings Related to the Financial Statements

INSTANCES OF NON-COMPLIANCE

No matters were reported.

SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCIES

- A. Segregation of Duties - The limited number of accounting personnel makes it difficult to achieve adequate internal accounting control through the segregation of duties and responsibilities. I noted that the same individual performed the following duties: recording and processing cash receipts, preparing checks and bank reconciliations, preparation of journals and general financial information for ledger posting, and the analysis of financial information. A small staff makes it difficult to establish an ideal system of automatic internal checks on accounting record accuracy and reliability, although I noted the District had taken steps to segregate duties between the present personnel. This is not an unusual condition but it is important the District officials are aware that the condition exists.

Recommendation - I realize that with a limited number of office employees, segregation of duties is difficult. However, the District should review the operating procedures of the District to obtain the maximum internal control possible under the circumstances.

Response - We will review our procedures and implement changes to improve internal control, as we deem necessary.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

- B. Financial Statement Preparation - Financial statement preparation is the responsibility of the District. At the present time, District personnel do not have the skills necessary to prepare the District's financial statements and related note disclosures in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This is not an unusual situation for small governmental entities.

Recommendation - The business manager should consider obtaining additional GAAP training through reading relevant accounting literature and/or attending professional education courses. Since GAAP reporting and disclosures change constantly, the business manager should consider taking training annually to stay up-to-date on GAAP reporting and disclosure requirements. The District should also obtain current governmental accounting, reporting and disclosure reference materials and update them as new pronouncements become effective.

Response - We believe that the business manager has sufficient knowledge to perform her daily duties and take responsibility for the annual financial statements and footnote disclosure in compliance with GAAP, as prepared by the auditor. We certainly understand the need for continuing education classes for all of our staff, including the business manager. However, we have a limited budget and must continually prioritize needs. We will investigate alternatives, but believe that it would not be an efficient use of District funds to get and maintain the necessary training for the business manager to comply with this recommendation. Nor do we consider hiring additional staff possessing these skills to be a feasible option.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

Part II. Other Findings Related to Statutory Reporting:

1. Certified Budget - Expenditures for the year ended June 30, 2009 did not exceed the amounts budgeted.
2. Questionable Expenditures - I noted no expenditures that may not meet the requirements of public purpose as defined in an Attorney General's opinion dated April 25, 1979.
3. Travel Expense - No expenditures of District money for travel expenses of spouses of District officials or employees were noted. No travel advances to District officials or employees were noted.
4. Business Transactions - No business transactions between the District and District officials or employees were noted.
5. Bond Coverage - Surety bond coverage of District officials and employees is in accordance with statutory provisions. The amount of coverage should be reviewed annually to insure that the coverage is adequate for current operations.
6. Board Minutes - I noted no transactions requiring Board approval which had not been approved by the Board.
7. Certified Enrollment - No variances in the basic enrollment data certified to the Iowa Department of Education were noted.
8. Deposits and Investments - I noted no instances of noncompliance with the deposit and investment provisions of Chapter 12B and Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa and the District's investment policy.
9. Certified Annual Reports - The Certified Annual Report was certified to the Department of Education timely and no material errors in fund balances were noted.

10. Financial Condition - The District had an unreserved, undesignated deficit in the Debt Service Fund of \$27,100 and the Preschool Fund had a net assets deficit of \$22,123 at June 30, 2009. Total enterprise funds had an unrestricted net assets deficit of \$13,548 at June 30, 2009.

Recommendation - The District should continue to monitor these funds and investigate alternatives to eliminate these deficits in order to return these funds to a sound financial condition.

Response - We will review these situations and implement changes, as needed.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

11. Categorical Funding - No instances were noted of categorical funding used to supplant rather than supplement other funds.

12. Statewide Sales and Services Tax - No instances of non-compliance with the use of the statewide sales and services tax revenue provisions of Chapter 423F.3 of the Code of Iowa were noted.

Pursuant to Chapter 423F.5 of the Code of Iowa, the annual audit is required to include certain reporting elements related to the statewide sales and services tax. For the year ended June 30, 2009, the District's financial activity and other required information for the statewide sales and services tax are as follows:
