## Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors of  
Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9  
Bettendorf, Iowa

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, which collectively comprise the Agency's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of Agency officials. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and OMB Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9, as of June 30, 2009, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated October 26, 2009, on our consideration of the Agency's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis, Budgetary Comparison Information, and Schedule of Funding Progress for the Retiree Health Plan on pages 4 through 11 and 31 through 34 are not required parts of the basic financial statements, but are supplemental information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplemental information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's basic financial statements. The financial statements for the three years ended June 30, 2008 (none of which are presented herein) were audited, in accordance with the standards referred to in the second paragraph of this report, by other auditors who expressed unqualified opinions on those financial statements. The combining nonmajor fund schedules and the schedule of revenues by source and expenditures by function - all governmental fund types listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of State and Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

June 30, 2009**

Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 provides this Management's Discussion and Analysis of its financial statements. This narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities is for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009. We encourage readers to consider this information in conjunction with the Agency's financial statements, which follow.

**2009 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS**

- General Fund revenues increased from \$32,090,133 in fiscal year 2008 (FY08) to \$35,046,107 in fiscal year 2009 (FY09), while General Fund expenditures increased from \$30,634,029 in FY08 to \$34,011,134 in FY09. This resulted in an increase of the Agency's General Fund balance from \$4,927,856 in FY08 to \$5,647,781 in FY09, a 14.6 percent increase from the prior year.
- The increase in General Fund revenues was attributable to an increase in state controlled funding and teacher compensation funding and the addition of Federal ARRA funds in FY09. The increase in expenditures was due primarily to the addition of the Federal ARRA funds increase.
- During the year ended June 30, 2003, the State of Iowa imposed a 7.5% reduction in AEA controlled funding which reduced general fund revenue by \$767,782. This cut continued into 2008-2009.
- Senate File 453 was enacted in the Spring of 2003, which temporarily reduced controlled funding for AEA's by 10 million dollars. AEA 9's portion of this was \$1,009,065. This reduction was reduced to \$253,937 in FY09.
- The Agency's self-insured medical insurance program continued to experience favorable claim costs. The Agency was able to maintain a minimum balance at \$1,500,000. The claims reserve balance at 6/30/2009 was \$1,935,855.
- The State of Iowa expanded its Teacher Quality funding in FY09. AEA 9's portion amounted to \$1,038,129. This was an increase of \$378,531 over FY08. The State of Iowa also provided \$101,754 for professional development in FY09.

**USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT**

The annual report consists of a series of financial statements and other information, as follows:

- Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the Agency's financial activities.
- The Government-wide Financial Statements consist of a statement of net assets and a statement of activities. These provide information about the activities of Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 as a whole and present an overall view of the Agency's finances.
- The Fund Financial Statements tell how governmental services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements report the Agency's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the most significant funds.
- Notes to Financial Statements provide additional information essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.
- Required Supplemental Information further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the Agency's budget for the year.
- Other Supplemental Information provides detailed information about the nonmajor funds. In addition, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards provides detail of various federal programs benefiting the Agency.

**Reporting the Agency as a Whole**

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities

The Government-wide statements report information about the Agency as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net assets includes all of the Agency's assets and liabilities. All of the current year revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two Government-wide statements report the Agency's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets - the difference between the Agency's assets and liabilities - are one way to measure the Agency's financial health or position.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the Agency's net assets are an indicator of whether financial position is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the Agency's overall health, additional non-financial factors, such as changes in the Agency's enrollment served and the condition of its facilities, need to be considered.
- *Governmental activities:* Most of the Agency's basic services are included here, such as regular and special education instruction, student and instructional staff support services, and administration. Local school districts, federal, and state aid financed most of these activities.

#### Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the Agency's funds, focusing on its most significant or "major" funds - not the Agency as a whole. Funds are accounting devices the Agency uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs. Some funds are required by state law or by bond covenants. The Agency establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes, such as accounting for major construction projects or to show that it is properly using certain revenues, such as federal grants.

The Agency has one kind of fund:

Governmental funds account for most of the Agency's basic services. These focus on how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Agency's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the Government-wide statements, additional information at the bottom of the governmental fund statements explains the relationship or differences between the two statements. The Agency's governmental funds include: 1) the General Fund, 2) the Special Revenue Funds, and 3) the Debt Service Fund.

The governmental funds required financial statements include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances.

A summary reconciliation between the Government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements follows the fund financial statements.

**GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS**

As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of financial position. Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's net assets at the end of fiscal year 2009 totaled approximately \$5.72 million. This compared to approximately \$5.35 million at the end of fiscal year 2008. The analysis that follows provides a summary of the Agency's net assets at June 30, 2009 for the governmental activities.

Operating grants and contributions from local, state and federal sources account for 94.3% of the total revenue. The Agency's expenses primarily relate to instruction and support services, which account for 81.9% of the total expenses.

**GOVERNMENTAL ACTIVITIES**

Revenues for governmental activities were \$35,559,379 and expenses were \$35,192,797. The Agency continues to maintain current services offered with cuts in funding.

**FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE AGENCY'S FUNDS**

As previously noted, Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

The Agency's governmental funds reported combined fund balances of \$6,109,869 above last year's ending fund balances of \$5,400,505. The major reason for the increase is due to contributions from local, state and federal sources, and a reallocation of Special Education expenditures to Federal Stimulus funds.

**Governmental Fund Highlights**

- The General Fund balance increased from \$4,927,856 to \$5,647,781. Encumbrance reserves decreased \$281,790, inventory and prepaid expenses reserve decreased \$123,338, insurance claims reserve decreased \$211,930, and unreserved undesignated fund balances increased \$1,336,983.
- The Debt Service Fund balance decreased due to the payment of principle and interest in FY09. The fund ended FY08 with a balance of \$462,400. FY09 ended with a balance of \$462,088.

**BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS**

Over the course of the year, the Agency amended its annual operating budget one time to reflect additional revenue and expenditures associated with the additional federal grants received. A schedule showing the original and final budget amounts compared to the Agency's actual financial activity is included in the required supplemental information section of this report.

**CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION**

**Capital Assets**

At June 30, 2009, the Agency had invested \$6,622,595 net of accumulated depreciation, in a broad range of capital assets, including land, buildings, computers and audio-visual equipment. This is a net decrease of approximately \$258,000 from last year. This decrease was primarily due to the current year depreciation expense and deletions exceeding the current year additions.

Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 had depreciation expense of \$524,100 in FY09 and total accumulated depreciation of \$4,951,221 at June 30, 2009. More detailed information about capital assets is available in Note 3 to the financial statements.

**Debt**

At June 30, 2009, the Agency had \$6,988,081 in long-term debt outstanding compared to \$6,902,235 at June 30, 2008. More detailed information about the Agency's long-term liabilities is available in Note 4 to the financial statements.

**ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET**

At the time these financial statements were prepared and audited, the Agency was aware of several existing circumstances that could significantly affect its financial health in the future:

- The Agency has experienced a decrease in the number of students being served by its programs for many years. A slight decrease in enrollment is expected to continue in the foreseeable future. Enrollment history and projections is as follows:

- The State of Iowa made permanent the 7.5% reduction in AEA controlled funding that was imposed in the year ended 6/30/02. This is a permanent reduction of \$767,782 from the funds generated by the controlled funding formula.

- Another provision of Senate File 453 enacted in the Spring of 2003 temporarily reduced controlled funding for AEAs by 10 million dollars. AEA 9's portion of this is \$1,009,065. This reduction was offset by an increase in federal IDEA funds, cost containment of non-personnel expenditures, and unreserved fund balances. This cut was reduced to \$253,937 in FY09. The cut will remain at \$253,937 in FY10.
- In the spring of 2008 the State of Iowa passed Senate File 277 which enhanced the Teacher Quality Program. AEA 9 received \$1,038,129 additional teacher compensation and \$101,754 for additional staff development in FY09. This will remain the same for FY10.
- Due to the favorable balance in the self-funded insurance claims fund, no increase in health and dental premiums will be made for FY10.
- AEA 9 was awarded \$5,696,785 in Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds. The funds are to be spent during the period of February 17, 2009 through September 30, 2011. The funds will be used to retain staff and offer additional programs. AEA 9 used \$500,631 of these funds in FY09.

**NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 is an intermediate school corporation established to identify and serve children who require special education. The Agency also provides media services and education support services. These programs and support services are provided to 22 school districts and private schools in a six-county area. The Agency is governed by a Board of Directors whose members are elected on a non-partisan basis.

**Reporting Entity**

For financial reporting purposes, Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 has included all funds, organizations, agencies, boards, commissions, and authorities. The Agency has also considered all potential component units for which it is financially accountable, and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the Agency are such that exclusion would cause the Agency's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability. These criteria include appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body, and (1) the ability of the Agency to impose its will on that organization or (2) the potential for the organization to provide specific benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on the Agency. The Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 has no component units which meet the Governmental Accounting Standards Board criteria.

**Basis of Presentation**

Government-wide financial statements - The statement of net assets and the statement of activities report information on all of the activities of the Agency. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements.

The statement of net assets presents the Agency's nonfiduciary assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Net assets are reported in three categories:

*Invested in capital assets, net of related debt* consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by outstanding balances for bonds, notes, and other debt that are attributed to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

*Restricted net assets* result when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

*Unrestricted net assets* consist of net assets that do not meet the definition of the two preceding categories. Unrestricted net assets often have constraints on resources that are imposed by management, but can be removed or modified.

**NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function and 2) grants, contributions, and interest that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function. Unrestricted interest income and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements - Separate financial statements are provided for governmental and proprietary funds. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as other nonmajor governmental funds.

The Agency reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Agency. All general revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, including instructional, support, and other costs.

The Debt Service Fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for payment of principal and interest on certificates of participation.

**Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting**

The Government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus. The Government-wide financial statements are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Agency considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days after year-end.

**NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**

Intergovernmental revenues (shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments) and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the Agency.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, principal and interest on long-term debt, claims and judgments and compensated absences are recognized as expenditures only when payment is due. Capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

**Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Equity**

**Cash and Investments** - Cash includes amounts in demand deposits and money market funds. Investments are stated at fair value except for the investment in Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust which is valued at amortized cost and non-negotiable certificates of deposit which are stated at cost.

All short-term cash investments that are highly liquid are considered to be cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and, at the day of purchase, have a maturity date no longer than three months.

**Inventories** - Inventories are stated at cost using the first-in, first-out method and consist of expendable supplies and materials. The cost of these items is recorded as an expenditure at the time of sale or consumption.

**Capital Assets** - Capital assets, which include property and furniture and equipment, are reported in the governmental activities column in the Government-wide statement of net assets. Capital assets are recorded at historical cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized. Capital assets are defined by the Agency as assets with initial, individual costs in excess of the following thresholds and estimated useful lives in excess of two years.

**Impairment of Long-Lived Assets** - The Agency reviews long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Recoverability of assets to be held and used is measured by a comparison of the carrying amount of an asset to future undiscounted net cash flows expected to be generated by the asset. If such assets are considered to be impaired, the impairment to be recognized is measured by the amount by which the carrying amount of the assets exceeds the fair value of the assets. Assets to be disposed of are reported at the lower of carrying amount or the fair value less costs to sell.

**Salaries and Benefits Payable** - Payroll and related expenses for teachers with annual contracts corresponding to the current school year, which are payable in July and August, have been accrued as liabilities.

**Deferred Revenue** - Deferred revenue represents an excess of cash advances by the funding source over accrued expenditures at year-end.

**Compensated Absences** - Agency employees accumulate a limited amount of earned but unused vacation and paid time off hours for subsequent use or for payment upon termination, death or retirement. A liability has been recorded in the statement of net assets representing the Agency's commitment to fund non-current compensated absences. This liability has been computed based on rates of pay in effect at June 30, 2009. The compensated absences liability attributable to the governmental activities will be paid primarily by the General and Special Revenue Funds.

**Long-Term Obligations** - In the Government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the governmental activities column in the statement of net assets.

**Fund Balances** - In the governmental fund financial statements, reservations of fund balance are reported for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose.

**Restricted Net Assets** - In the Government-wide statement of net assets, net assets are reported as restricted when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or laws and regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

**NOTE 2 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS**

The Agency's deposits in banks at June 30, 2009 were entirely covered by Federal depository insurance, or by the State sinking fund in accordance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa. This chapter provides for additional assessments against the depositories to insure there will be no loss of public funds.

The Agency is authorized by statute to invest public funds in obligations of the United States Government, its agencies and instrumentalities; certificates of deposit or other evidences of deposit at federally insured depository institutions approved by the Board of Directors; prime eligible bankers acceptances; certain high rated commercial paper; perfected repurchase agreements; certain registered open-end management investment companies; certain joint investment trusts, and warrants or improvement certificates of a drainage district.

The Agency had investments in the Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust Diversified Portfolio which are valued at an amortized cost of \$7,279,508 pursuant to Rule 2a-7 under the Investment Company Act of 1940. The investment in the Iowa Schools Joint Investment Trust is rated AAA by Moody's Investors Service.

Certificates of Participation

On May 1, 2005, the Agency issued \$4,660,000 of Refunding Certificates of Participation, Series 2005A, with interest rates ranging from 3.60% to 4.45%, for various project costs and a crossover refunding of the Series 1997 Certificates of Participation issued July 1, 1997. The Agency entered into an escrow agreement whereby a portion of the proceeds of the refunding certificates of participation along with additional cash were placed in an escrow account for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on the refunded certificates of participation when they are subject to optional redemption in whole or in part on May 1, 2008. \$1,500,000 of the proceeds were placed into a construction fund to pay for various project costs. The transactions, balances and liabilities of the escrow account are recorded by the Agency since the refunded debt is not considered extinguished. Annual debt service requirements to maturity of the refunding certificates of participation are as follows:

The advance refunding increased total debt service payments over the next 20 years by over \$738,000. This results in an economic loss (difference between the present values of the debt service payments on the old and new debt) of \$33,425.

**NOTE 5 - OPERATING LEASES**

The Agency has leased various facilities to house satellite facilities. These leases have been classified as operating leases and accordingly, all rents are charged to expenditures as incurred. One lease expired December 31, 2004 and was renewed. Other leases are renewable for additional periods. Some of the leases also require the payment of normal maintenance and insurance on the properties. In all cases, management expects that the leases will be renewed or replaced by other leases.

**NOTE 6 - PENSION AND RETIREMENT BENEFITS**

The Agency contributes to the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Iowa. IPERS provides retirement and death benefits which are established by State statute to plan members and beneficiaries. IPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplemental information. The report may be obtained by writing to IPERS, P.O. Box 9117, Des Moines, Iowa 50306-9117.

Plan members are required to contribute 4.10% of their annual salary and the Agency is required to contribute 6.35% of annual payroll. Contribution requirements are established by State statute. The Agency's contributions to IPERS for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008, and 2007, were \$1,299,594, \$1,136,983, and \$1,069,772, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

**NOTE 7 - RISK MANAGEMENT**

The Agency is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft; damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by the purchase of commercial insurance. The Agency assumes liability for any deductibles and claims in excess of coverage limitations. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Litigation

The Agency is a defendant in several lawsuits. Outside council for the Agency has advised that one of the claims has been answered and is being defended vigorously. Insurance coverage is being afforded for all other claims.

Self-funded insurance plans

The Agency has self-funded health and dental insurance plans. The Agency purchases commercial insurance to provide for aggregate stop-loss health coverage for 125% of the excess of estimated claims for the plan year that exceed \$2,291,003, and specific stop-loss health insurance coverage for claims in excess of \$70,000 for any one covered individual during the plan year.

**NOTE 8 - POST-EMPLOYEE BENEFITS OTHER THAN PENSION BENEFITS**

The Agency implemented GASB Statement No. 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits other Than Pensions during the year ended June 30, 2009.

Plan Description - The Agency operates a self-funded insurance plan which provides medical/prescription drug benefits for retirees and their families. There are 329 active and 13 retired members in the plan. Participants must be age 55 or older at retirement.

The medical/prescription drug coverage is provided through the Agency's plan. Retirees under age 65 pay the same premium for the medical/prescription drug benefit as active employees, which results in an implicit subsidy and an OPEB liability.

Funding Policy - The contribution requirements of plan members are established and may be amended by the Agency. The Agency currently finances the retiree benefit plan on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation - The Agency's annual OPEB cost is calculated based on the annual required contribution (ARC) of the Agency, an amount actuarially determined in accordance with GASB Statement No. 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities over a period not to exceed 30 years.

The following table shows the components of the Agency's annual OPEB cost for the year ended June 30, 2009, the amount actually contributed to the plan and changes in the Agency's net OPEB obligation:

For calculation of the net OPEB obligation, the actuary has set the transition day as July 1, 2008. The end of year net OPEB obligation was calculated by the actuary as the cumulative difference between the actuarially determined funding requirements and the estimated contributions for the year ended June 30, 2009.

For the year ended June 30, 2009, the estimated Agency contributions were \$69,000 to the medical plan. Plan members eligible for benefits contributed 100% of the premium costs.

Funded Status and Funding Progress - As of July 1, 2008, the most recent actuarial valuation date for the period July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009, the actuarial accrued liability was \$2.386 million, with no actuarial value of assets, resulting in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) of \$2.386 million. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was approximately \$20,815,000, and the ratio of the UAAL to covered payroll was 11.5%. Actuarial Methods and Assumptions - Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumption about future employment, mortality and the health care cost trend. Actuarially determined amounts are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, presented as required supplemental information in the section following the Notes to Financial Statements, will present multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

As of the July 1, 2008 actuarial valuation date, the unit credit actuarial cost method was used. The actuarial assumptions includes a 4.5% discount rate based on the Agency's funding policy. The projected annual medical trend rate is 11%. The ultimate medical trend rate is 5%. The medical trend rate is reduced 0.5% each year until reaching the 5% ultimate trend rate.

Mortality rates are from the RP2000 Group Annuity Mortality Table, applied on a gender-specific basis. Annual retirement and termination probabilities were developed from the retirement probabilities from the IPERS Actuarial Report as of June 30, 2007 and applying the termination factors used in the IPERS Actuarial Report as of June 30, 2007.

The Agency's Board of Directors annually prepares a budget on a basis consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Although the budget document presents functional disbursements by fund, the legal level of control is at the total expenditure/expense level, not by fund. After required public notice and hearing in accordance with the Code of Iowa, the Board submits its budget to the State Board of Education. The State Board reviews the proposed budget and either grants approval or returns it without approval with comments. Any unapproved budget must be resubmitted to the State Board for final approval. The budget may be amended during the year utilizing procedures prescribed by the State Board.

For the year ended June 30, 2009, disbursements exceeded the amounts budgeted in the instruction function.

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. We consider the deficiency described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item II-A-09 to be a significant deficiency in internal control over financial reporting.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we believe that the significant deficiency described above is not a material weaknesses.

### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*. However, we noted certain immaterial instances of noncompliance that we have reported to management of Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9 in a separate letter dated October 26, 2009.

Comments involving statutory and other legal matters about Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's operations for the year ended June 30, 2009 are based exclusively on knowledge obtained from procedures performed during our audit of the financial statements of Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9. Since our audit was based on tests and samples, not all transactions that might have had an impact on the comments were necessarily audited. The comments involving statutory and other legal matters are not intended to constitute legal interpretations of those statutes.

Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. While we have expressed our conclusions on Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's responses, we did not audit Mississippi Bend Area Education Agency 9's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.
