Independent Auditors' Report

To the Honorable Mayor and
Members of the City Council

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Parkersburg, Iowa, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the City of Parkersburg's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash basis financial position of the governmental activities, the business type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Parkersburg as of June 30, 2010, and the respective changes in cash basis financial position for the year then ended in conformity with the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 11, 2011, on our consideration of the City of Parkersburg's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance, and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in conformance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages 4 through 8 and 20 through 21 are not required parts of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. We did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the City of Parkersburg's basic financial statements. We previously audited, in accordance with the standards referred to in the second paragraph of this report, the financial statements for the seven years ended June 30, 2009 (which are not presented herein) and expressed unqualified opinions on those financial statements which were prepared in conformity with an other comprehensive basis of accounting. Other supplementary information included on pages 22 through 27, including the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations*, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Management Discussion and Analysis

City of Parkersburg, Iowa provides this Management's Discussion and Analysis of its financial statements. This narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities is for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010. We encourage readers to consider this information in conjunction with the City's financial statements, which follow.

2010 Financial Highlights

- Revenues of the City's governmental activities decreased 33% or approximately \$7,134,365, from fiscal 2009 to fiscal 2010. Property tax increased approximately \$82,396 (including TIF funds).
- Disbursements decreased 48%, or approximately \$4,764,000, in fiscal 2010 from fiscal 2009. Public works disbursements decreased \$22,781 and community and economic development disbursements increased \$371,990.
- The City's total cash basis net assets decreased by \$967,000 from June 30, 2009 to June 30, 2010. Of this amount, the assets of the governmental activities decreased \$1,045,000 and the assets of the business type activities increased by approximately \$78,000.

Using This Annual Report

The annual report consists of a series of financial statements and other information as follows:

Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the City's financial activities.

The Government-wide Financial Statement consists of a Statement of Activities and Net Assets. This statement provides information about the activities of the City as a whole and presents an overall view of the City's finances.

The Fund Financial Statements tell how governmental services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements report the City's operations in more detail than the government-wide statement by providing information about the most significant funds.

Notes to financial statements provide additional information essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.

Required Supplementary Information further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the City's budget for the year.

Other Supplementary Information provides detailed information about the non major governmental funds.

Basis of Accounting

The City maintains its financial records on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements and the financial statements of the City are prepared on that basis. The cash basis of accounting does not give effect to accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued items. Accordingly, the financial statements do not present financial position and results of operations of the funds in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Therefore, when reviewing the financial information and discussion within this annual report, the reader should keep in mind the limitations resulting from the use of the cash basis of accounting.

Reporting the City's Financial Activities

Government -wide Financial Statement

One of the most important questions asked about the City's finances is, "Is the City as a whole better off or worse off as a result of the year's activities?" The Statement of Activities and Net Assets provides information that helps answer this question.

The Statement of Activities and Net Assets present the City's net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in the City's net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the City is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities and Net Assets is divided into two kinds of activities:

- Governmental Activities include public safety, public works, health and social services, culture and recreation, community and economic development, general government, debt service and capital projects. Property tax and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.
- Business Type Activities include the waterworks and the sanitary sewer system. These activities are financed primarily by user charges.

Fund Financial Statements

The City has two kinds of funds:

- 1) Governmental funds account for most of the City's basic services. These focus on how money flows into and out of those funds, and the balances at year-end that are available for spending. The governmental funds include: 1) the General Fund, 2) the Special Revenue Funds, such as Road Use Tax and Urban Renewal Tax Increment, 3) the Debt Service Fund, 4) the Capital Projects Fund and 5) the Permanent Fund. The governmental fund financial statements provide a detailed, short-term view of the City's general governmental operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the City's programs.

The required financial statements for governmental funds include a statement of cash receipts, disbursements and changes in cash balances.

- 2) Proprietary funds account for the City's Enterprise Funds. Enterprise Funds are used to report business type activities. The City maintains two Enterprise Funds to provide separate information for the water and sewer funds, considered to be major funds of the City.

The required financial statements for proprietary funds include a statement of cash receipts, disbursements and changes in cash balances.

Government- Wide Financial Analysis

Net Assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of financial position. The City's cash balance for governmental activities increased from a year ago, decreasing from \$1,466,655 to \$421,208. The analysis that follows focuses on the changes in cash balances for governmental activities.

The City's total receipts decreased for governmental activities by 38% or \$7,135,000. The total cost of all programs and services decreased by \$4,764,000, or 51%. The decrease in receipts was primarily due to a decrease in FEMA funding from the previous year due to projects being completed, and decreases in capital grants, contributions, and/or restricted interest from factors affected by the Parkersburg tornado. There was also an increase in TIF revenue, and a slight increase in total property taxes collected in 2010 due to the continued rebuilding of the community.

The City decreased the property tax levy from 17.94482 / \$1000 valuation in 2009 to 17.91132 / \$1000 valuation in 2010. Due to new construction, this still increased the City's property tax receipts by \$8,867 in 2010. Based on increases in the total assessed valuation due to the tornado, total property tax receipts are budgeted to remain fairly consistent in fiscal years 2011 and 2012.

The cost of all governmental activities this year was \$4,539,826 compared to \$9,303,946 last year.

Total business type activities receipts for the fiscal year were \$400,000 compared to \$284,000 last year. The cash balance increased by \$78,000 from the prior year. Total disbursements for the fiscal year decreased to \$322,000 compared to \$365,000 last year.

Individual Major Governmental Fund Analysis

As the City of Parkersburg completed the year, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$421,208, a decrease of \$1,045,447 from last year's total of \$1,466,655. The following are the major reasons for the changes in fund balances of the major funds from the prior year.

- The General Fund cash balance decreased to \$183,137 from the prior year balance of \$1,190,150.
- The Road Use Tax Fund cash balance increased by \$22,926 to a negative balance of \$31,052 during the fiscal year. Reduced spending should improve this deficit.
- The TIF fund cash balance decreased by \$76,611 to \$173,171.

Individual Major Business Type Fund Analysis

- The Water Fund cash balance increased by \$88,058 to \$71,710.
- The Sewer Fund cash balance decreased by \$9,877 to \$101,337.

- **Budgetary Highlights**

The City did amend its budget during the year.

Debt Administration

At June 30, 2010, the City had approximately \$2,470,000 in bonds and other long-term debt, compared to approximately \$2,696,000 last year, as shown below.

Debt decreased as a result of continued scheduled payments on outstanding debt.

The Constitution of the State of Iowa limits the amount of general obligation debt cities can issue of 5% of the assessed value of all taxable property with the City's corporate limits. The City's outstanding general obligation debt of \$2,470,000 is below its constitutional debt limit of \$4,386,344.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The city of Parkersburg's elected and appointed officials and citizens considered many factors when setting the fiscal year 2011 budget, tax rates, and fees that will be charged for various city activities. One of those factors is the economy. The City's employment growth has mirrored its population growth during 2002-2008, averaging 6 new houses being built each year prior to the Parkersburg tornado. After losing 288 homes in the tornado, over 200 homes have been rebuilt. Most businesses have rebuilt and new businesses have started in Parkersburg since the tornado.

Fuel costs continue to fluctuate and the operating costs for providing all services continue to rise. The May 25, 2008 tornado still continues to impact every aspect of city government spending. We continue to work with FEMA, the State of Iowa, and our local and regional partners to manage all the recovery issues that continue to persist and to secure funding for many future capital projects.

These indicators and the Parkersburg tornado in May, 2008, were once again taken into account when adopting the budget for fiscal year 2011. Amounts available for appropriation in the operating budget are \$2,065,907 which is slightly higher than the final 2010 budget. The City Council and Mayor have made every effort to keep the City financially sound. The City's budgeted cash balance is not expected to increase by the close of 2010. The City of Parkersburg continues to operate in the most efficient way possible. Parkersburg's future economic well-being is more optimistic than in the prior year because of our citizens' rebuilding efforts and the spirit of the community.

Notes to Financial Statements
June 30, 2010

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The City of Parkersburg is a political subdivision of the State of Iowa located in Butler County. It was first incorporated in 1874 and operates under the Home Rule provisions of the Constitution of Iowa. The City operates under the Mayor-Council form of government with the Mayor and Council Members elected on a non-partisan basis. The City provides numerous services to citizens, including public safety, public works, health and social services, culture and recreation, community and economic development, and general government services. The City also provides water and sewer utilities for its citizens.

A. Reporting Entity

For financial reporting purposes, the City of Parkersburg has included all funds, organizations, agencies, boards, commissions and authorities. The City has also considered all potential component units for which it is financially accountable, and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the City are such that exclusion would cause the City's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability. These criteria include appointing a voting majority of an Organization's governing body, and (1) the ability of the City to impose its will on that organization or (2) the potential for the Organization to provide specific benefits to or impose specific financial burdens on the City.

The government-wide financial statements present the City of Parkersburg (the primary government) and its component unit. The component unit discussed in Note 10 is included in the City's reporting entity because of the significance of its operational and financial relationship with the City. The component unit's cash receipts and disbursements are discretely presented on the City's financial statements and condensed information is presented in Note 10.

Jointly Governed Organization

The City participates in a jointly governed organization that provides goods or services to the citizenry of the City but does not meet the criteria of a joint venture since there is no ongoing financial interest or responsibility by the participating government. An official is a member of the Butler County Joint E911 Service Board.

B. Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements - The Statement of Activities and Net Assets - Cash Basis reports information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the City. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from this statement. Governmental activities, which are supported by tax and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for services.

B. Basis of Presentation (continued)

The Statement of Activities and Net Assets - Cash Basis presents the City's nonfiduciary net assets. Net assets are reported in two categories:

Nonexpendable restricted net assets are subject to externally imposed stipulations which require them to be maintained permanently by the City, including the City's Permanent Fund.

Expendable restricted net assets result when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed or imposed by law through constitutional provisions of enabling legislation.

Unrestricted net assets consist of net assets not meeting the definition of the preceding categories. Unrestricted net assets often have constraints on resources imposed by management, which can be removed or modified.

The Statement of Activities and Net Assets - Cash Basis demonstrates the degree to which the direct disbursements of a given function or segment are offset by program receipts. Direct disbursements are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program receipts include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function and 2) grants, contributions and interest on investments restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function. Property tax and other items not properly included among program receipts are reported instead as general receipts.

Fund Financial Statements - Separate financial statements are provided for the governmental funds and proprietary funds. Major individual governmental funds and major individual enterprise funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as other nonmajor governmental funds.

The City reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the City. All general tax receipts and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating disbursements, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid from other funds.

Special Revenue:

The Road Use Tax Fund is used to account for road construction and maintenance.

The Urban Renewal Tax Increment Fund is used to account for urban renewal projects financed by tax increment financing.

The Debt Service Fund is utilized to account for the payment of interest and principal on the City's general long-term debt.

The City reports the following major proprietary funds:

The Enterprise, Water Fund accounts for the operation and maintenance of the City's water system.

The Enterprise, Sewer Fund accounts for the operation and maintenance of the City's waste water treatment and sanitary sewer system.

C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The City of Parkersburg maintains its financial records on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements and the financial statements of the City are prepared on that basis. The cash basis of accounting does not give effect to accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued items. Accordingly, the financial statements do not present financial position and results of operations of the funds in accordance with accounting principles general accepted in the United States of America.

Under terms of grant agreements, the City funds certain programs by a combination of specific cost-reimbursement grants, categorical block grants and general receipts. Thus, when program disbursements are paid, there are both restricted and unrestricted cash basis net assets available to finance the program. It is the City's policy to first apply cost-reimbursement grant resources to such programs, followed by categorical block grants and then by general receipts.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating receipts and disbursements from nonoperating items. Operating receipts and disbursements generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. All receipts and disbursements not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating receipts and disbursements.

D. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The budgetary comparison and related disclosures are reported as Required Supplementary Information. During the year ended June 30, 2010, disbursements exceeded the amounts budgeted in the culture and recreation, general government, debt service, and capital projects functions.

(2) Cash and Pooled Investments

The City's deposits in banks at June 30, 2010 were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by the State Sinking Fund in accordance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa. This chapter provides for additional assessments against the depositories to insure there will be no loss of public funds.

(2) Cash and Pooled Investments (continued)

The City is authorized by statute to invest public funds in obligations of the United States government, its agencies and instrumentalities; certificates of deposit or other evidences of deposit at federally insured depository institutions approved by the City Council; prime eligible bankers acceptances; certain high rated commercial paper; perfected repurchase agreements; certain registered open-end management investment companies; certain joint investment trusts; and warrants or improvement certificates of a drainage district.

Interest rate risk. The City's investment policy limits the investment of operating funds (funds expected to be expended in the current budget year or within 15 months of receipt) in instruments that mature within 397 days. Funds not identified as operating funds may be invested in investments with maturities longer than 397 days but the maturities shall be consistent with the needs and use of the City.

The City's investments at June 30, 2010 were certificates of deposit only.

(3) Bonds and Notes Payable

The general obligation corporate purpose bonds, series 2006, were issued for the purpose of defraying a portion of the costs of constructing water and sanitary sewer improvements, a fire station, and downtown projects (street, curb and gutter, sewer, and sidewalk), within the City and to pay the cost of issuance of the bonds. The bonds will constitute valid and legally binding general obligations of the City, payable both as to principal and interest from unlimited ad valorem taxes levied against all property in the City.

The general obligation corporate purpose bonds, series 2007, were issued for the purpose of defraying a portion of the costs of constructing the fire station and other infrastructure projects within the City and to pay the cost of issuance of the bonds. The bonds will constitute valid and legally binding general obligations of the City, payable both as to principal and interest from unlimited ad valorem taxes levied against all property in the City.

(4) Pension and Retirement Benefits

The City contributes to the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Iowa. IPERS provides retirement and death benefits which are established by State statute to plan members and beneficiaries. IPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to IPERS, P.O. Box 9117, Des Moines, Iowa 50306-9117.

(4) Pension and Retirement Benefits (continued)

Most regular plan members are required to contribute 4.30% of their annual covered salary and the City is required to contribute 6.65% of annual covered payroll. Certain employees in special risk occupations and the City contribute an actuarially determined contribution rate. Contributions requirements are established by state statute. The City's contribution to IPERS for the years ended June 30, 2010, 2009 and 2008 were \$26,181, \$26,131 and \$21,007 respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

(5) Compensated Absences

Full time City employees accumulate vacation and sick leave hours for subsequent use. These accumulations are not recognized as disbursements by the City until used or paid.

Vacation hours not used as of June 30 each year are forfeited. The City has no liability for earned vacation payable to employees at June 30, 2010. Sick leave is payable only when used and not upon retirement or death.

Full time City employees qualify for overtime pay when hours worked in a specific week exceed 40 hours. The employee is entitled to be paid for the excess hours at one and one half their hourly rate or they may choose to accumulate comp time. At June 30, 2010, the accumulated comp time was \$5,334, using the rates of pay in effect at that time.

(6) Related Party Transactions

The City had no business transactions between the City and City officials during the year ended June 30, 2010.

(7) Anticipatory Warrants

Anticipatory warrants are the warrants which are legally drawn on City funds but are not paid for lack of funds, in accordance with Chapter 74 of the Code of Iowa. The warrants bear interest at rates in effect at the time the warrants are first presented for redemption.

There was not any anticipatory warrant activity for the year ended June 30, 2010.

(8) Construction Commitments

At June 30, 2010, the City had approved construction projects totaling \$6,461,6754. As of June 30, 2010, \$6,209,315 of these projects had been completed and had been paid. The remaining contract balances are to be completed and paid after June 30, 2010.

(9) Risk Management

The City of Parkersburg is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by the purchase of commercial insurance. The City assumes liability for any deductibles and claims in excess of coverage limitations. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

(10) Component Unit

The Statement of Activities and Net Assets - Cash Basis includes the discretely presented financial information of the City's component unit, Parkersburg Economic Development, whose relationship to the City is such that exclusion would cause the City's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. Parkersburg Economic Development is governed by an eight-member board.

Included in the receipts of the component unit is \$130,000 which is from the City of Parkersburg. Likewise, in the financial statements of the City, disbursements of \$130,000 are included in the Special Revenue, Urban Renewal Tax Increment fund, under the community and economic development function.

(11) Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

Plan Description - The City operates a single employer benefit plan which provides medical/prescription drug/dental benefits for full time employees and their families, and for retirees and their spouses. There are presently 8 active and 0 retired members in the plan. Participants must be age 55 or older at retirement.

(11) Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) (continued)

The medical/prescription drug/dental benefits are provided through a fully-insured plan with Wellmark. Retirees under age 65 pay the same premium for the medical/prescription drug/dental benefits as active employees.

Funding Policy - The contribution requirements of plan members are established and may be amended by the City. The City currently finances the retiree benefit plan on a pay-as-you-go basis. The most recent active member monthly premiums for the City and plan members are \$475 - \$518 for single coverage and \$1,193 for family coverage. The same monthly premiums would apply to retirees. For the year ended June 30, 2010, the City contributed \$105,438 and plan members eligible for benefits contributed \$0 to the plan.

The budgetary comparison is presented as Required Supplementary Information in accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 41 for governments with significant budgetary perspective differences resulting from not being able to present budgetary comparisons for the General Fund and each major Special Revenue Fund.

In accordance with the Code of Iowa, the City Council annually adopts a budget on the cash basis following required public notice and hearing for all funds except Internal Service Funds and Fiduciary Funds. The annual budget may be amended during the year utilizing similar statutorily prescribed procedures.

Formal and legal budgetary control for the certified budget is based upon nine major classes of disbursements known as functions, not by fund. These nine functions are: public safety, public works, health and social services, culture and recreation, community and economic development, general government, debt service, capital projects and business type activities. Function disbursements required to be budgeted include disbursements for the General Fund, the Special Revenue Funds, the Debt Service Fund, the Capital Projects Funds and the Enterprise Funds. Although the budget document presents function disbursements by fund, the legal level of control is at the aggregated function level, not by fund. During the year, a budget amendment increased the budgeted disbursements by \$1,245,700. The budget amendment is reflected in the final budgeted amounts.

During the year ended June 30, 2010, disbursements exceeded the amounts budgeted in the culture and recreation, general government, debt service, and capital projects functions.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business type activities, the aggregate discretely component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Parkersburg, Iowa, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements listed in the table of contents, and have issued our report thereon dated March 11, 2011. Our report expressed unqualified opinions on the financial statements which were prepared in conformity with an other comprehensive basis of accounting. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the City of Parkersburg's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of City of Parkersburg's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of City of Parkersburg's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility a material misstatement of City of Parkersburg's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, we identified a deficiency in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be a significant deficiency as described in Part II-A-1 of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. A significant deficiency in internal control over financial reporting is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control which is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the City of Parkersburg's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Comments involving statutory and other legal matters about the City's operations for the year ended June 30, 2010 are based exclusively on knowledge obtained from procedures performed during our audit of the financial statements of the City. Since our audit was based on tests and samples, not all transactions that might have had an impact on the comments were necessarily audited. The comments involving statutory and other legal matters are not intended to constitute legal interpretations of those statutes. Prior audit statutory comments have been resolved or are described in Part IV of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.

The City of Parkersburg's responses to findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. While we have expressed our conclusions on the City's responses, we did not audit the City of Parkersburg's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

The report, a public record by law, is intended solely for the information and use of the officials, employees and citizens of the City of Parkersburg and other parties to whom the City of Parkersburg may report, including federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities. This report is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of City of Parkersburg, Iowa, with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 *Compliance Supplement* that are applicable to its major federal program for the year ended June 30, 2010. City of Parkersburg's major federal program is identified in Part I of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements applicable to its major federal program is the responsibility of City of Parkersburg's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on City of Parkersburg's compliance based on our audit.

INTERNAL CONTROL DEFICIENCIES:

- II-A-10 Segregation of Duties - One important aspect of internal accounting control is the segregation of duties among employees. Recordkeeping is basically done by the City Clerk and the Deputy City Clerk. Because of the limited number of employees, they perform some cash-related duties that are incompatible.

Recommendation - We realize segregation of duties is difficult, if not impossible, in a small office and that certain previous recommendations for internal checks have been established; however, we feel that a reminder of this is justified so as to provide attention to these areas throughout the year and that operating procedures be reviewed so as to obtain the maximum internal control possible under the circumstances.

Response - The City will continue to have the financial records checked monthly by an independent CPA and do everything possible to comply.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

- II-B-10 Library Funds - The Library funds are a part of the City's cash balances and, as such, should be under the control of the City Clerk. Presently, certain Library accounts are only accessible by Library personnel.

Recommendation - The City Clerk has final responsibility for all City funds, and should have the ability to obtain information on all City accounts at every financial institution.

Response - The City has already taken steps to combine the Library's accounts to fall under the control of the City Clerk and to make all accounts accessible at every financial institution.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-A-10 Official Depositories - A resolution naming official depositories has been approved by the City. The maximum deposit amounts stated in that resolution were not exceeded during the year ended June 30, 2010.

IV-B-10 Certified Budget - Disbursements during the year ended June 30, 2010 exceeded the amounts budgeted in the Culture and Recreation, General Government, Debt Service, and Capital Projects programs. Chapter 384.20 of the Code of Iowa states in part that public monies may not be expended or encumbered except under an annual or continuing appropriation.

Recommendation - The budget should have been amended in accordance with Chapter 384.18 of the Code of Iowa before disbursements were allowed to exceed the budget.

Response - Expenditures will be monitored more closely so that the budget can be amended if needed.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-C-10 Entertainment Expense - We noted no disbursements for parties, banquets or other entertainment for employees that we believe may constitute an unlawful expenditure from public funds as defined in an Attorney General's opinion dated April 25, 1979.

IV-D-10 Travel Expense - No disbursements of City money for travel expenses of spouses of City officials or employees were noted.

IV-E-10 Bond Coverage - Surety bond coverage of City officials and employees is in accordance with statutory provisions. The amount of coverage should be reviewed annually to insure that the coverage is adequate for current operations.

IV-F-10 Council Minutes - No transactions were found that we believe should have been approved in the Council minutes but were not.

The minutes of Council proceedings were published within fifteen days as required by Chapter 372.13(6) of the Code of Iowa.

Response - The City is reducing its expenditures in the FY 2011 budget to help eliminate this deficit.




