INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Education of the
Maquoketa Valley Community School District:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business type activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Maquoketa Valley Community School District, Delhi, Iowa, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of District officials. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business type activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Maquoketa Valley Community School District at June 30, 2010, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, for the year then ended in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated March 21, 2011 on our consideration of Maquoketa Valley Community School District's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's Discussion and Analysis and Budgetary Comparison Information and Schedule of Funding Progress for the Retiree Health Plan on pages 7 through 16 and 42 through 44 are not required parts of the

basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the supplementary information. We did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Maquoketa Valley Community School District's basic financial statements. We previously audited, in accordance with the standards referred to in the second paragraph of this report, the financial statements for the six years ended June 30, 2009 (none of which are presented herein) and expressed an unqualified opinion on those financial statements. Other supplementary information included in Schedules 1 through 7, including the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Maquoketa Valley Community School District provides this Management's Discussion and Analysis of its financial statements. This narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities is for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010. We encourage readers to consider this information in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which follow.

2010 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- General Fund revenues decreased from \$7,678,317 at June 30, 2009 to \$7,337,369 at June 30, 2010, while General Fund expenditures decreased from \$7,688,883 at June 30, 2009 to \$7,329,064 at June 30, 2010. This resulted in an increase in the District's fund balance from \$1,461,775 at June 30, 2009 to \$1,470,080 at June 30, 2010, which was a 0.57% increase from the prior year.
- The decrease in revenues can be attributed to the 10% across the board cut by the state during the year. The decrease in expenditures was mainly a result of decreased expenditures in the instructional functional area.
- The District's solvency ratio (unreserved-undesignated fund balance/general fund revenues) decreased as compared to fiscal 2009. At June 30, 2009 the District's solvency ratio was 16.04% as compared to 13.96% at June 30, 2010. The State School Budget Review Committee recommends a solvency ratio of 5% - 10%.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The annual report consists of a series of financial statements and other information, as follows:

Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the basic financial statements and provides an analytical overview of the District's financial activities.

The Government-wide Financial Statements consist of a Statement of Net Assets and a Statement of Activities. These provide information about the activities of Maquoketa Valley Community School District as a whole and present an overall view of the District's finances.

The Fund Financial Statements tell how the governmental services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements report Maquoketa Valley Community School District's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the most significant funds. The remaining statements provide financial information about activities for which Maquoketa Valley Community School District acts solely as an agent or custodian for the benefit of those outside of the School District.

Notes to the financial statements provide additional information essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.

Required Supplementary Information further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the District's budget for the year, as well as presenting the Schedule of Funding Progress for the Retiree Health Plan.

Other Supplementary Information provides detailed information about the nonmajor funds. In addition, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards provides detail of various programs benefiting the District.

Figure A-1 shows how the various parts of this annual report are arranged and relate to one another.

Maquoketa Valley Community School District Annual Financial Report



REPORTING THE DISTRICT’S FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements report information about the District as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the District’s assets and liabilities. All of the current year’s revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities, regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two Government-wide statements report the District's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets – the difference between the District's assets and liabilities – are one way to measure the District's financial health or position.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net assets are an indicator of whether financial position is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the District's overall health, you need to consider additional non-financial factors such as changes in the District's property tax base and the condition of school buildings and other facilities.

In the government-wide financial statements, the District's activities are divided into two categories:

- *Governmental activities*: Most of the District's basic services are included here, such as regular and special education, transportation and administration. Property tax and state aid finance most of these activities.
- *Business type activities*: The District charges fees to help cover the costs of certain services it provides. The District's school nutrition program is included here.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's funds, focusing on its most significant or "major" funds – not the District as a whole. Funds are accounting devices the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs.

Some funds are required by state law and by bond covenants. The District establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes, such as accounting for student activity funds or to show that it is properly using certain revenues such as federal grants.

The District has three kinds of funds:

- 1) *Governmental funds*: Most of the District's basic services are included in governmental funds, which generally focus on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs.

The District's governmental funds include the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Fund and Debt Service Fund.

The required financial statements for the governmental funds include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances.

- 2) *Proprietary funds*: Services for which the District charges a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way as the government-wide financial statements. The District's enterprise funds, one type of proprietary fund, are the same as its business type activities, but provide more detail and additional information, such as cash flows. The District currently has one enterprise fund, the School Nutrition Fund.

The required financial statements for the proprietary funds include a statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets and a statement of cash flows.

- 3) *Fiduciary funds*: The District is a trustee, or fiduciary, for assets that belong to others. The Private-Purpose Trust Fund would be the District's only fiduciary fund.
 - Private-Purpose Trust Fund - The District accounts for outside donations for scholarships for individual students in this fund.

The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in the fiduciary funds are used only for their intended purposes and by those to whom the assets belong. The District excludes these activities from the Government-wide financial statements because it cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

The required financial statements for fiduciary funds include a statement of fiduciary net assets and a statement of changes in fiduciary net assets.

Reconciliations between the government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements follow the fund financial statements.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The District's combined net assets increased by 11.28% or \$793,674 over the prior year. The largest portion of the District's net assets is the invested in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings and equipment), less the related debt. The debt related to the investment in capital assets is liquidated with sources other than capital assets.

Restricted net assets represent resources that are subject to external restrictions, constitutional provisions or enabling legislation on how they can be used. The District's restricted net assets increased by 33.92% or \$485,683 over the prior year. The increase was primarily due to the increase in state categorical funding carryovers as well as the increase in fund balance for the Capital Projects Fund.

Unrestricted net assets-the part of net assets that can be used to finance day-by-day operations without constraints established by debt covenants, enabling legislation or other legal requirements increased by 5.22% or \$57,517 from the prior year. The increase is due in part to the increase in fund balance of the General Fund.

In fiscal 2010, property tax, statewide sales, services and use tax and unrestricted state grants account for 73.10% of the revenue from governmental activities while charges for services and operating grants and contributions account for 94.17% of the revenue from business type activities.

The District's total revenues were approximately \$9.34 million, of which approximately \$8.92 million was for governmental activities and approximately \$0.42 million was for business type activities.

As shown in Figure A-4, the District as a whole experienced a decrease of 1.20% in revenues and a 10.91% decrease in expenses.

Governmental Activities

Revenues for governmental activities were \$8,917,979 and expenses were \$8,130,528.

The following table presents the total and net cost of the District's major governmental activities: instruction, support services and other expenses for the year ended June 30, 2010 compared to the year ended June 30, 2009.

For the year ended June 30, 2010:

- The cost financed by users of the District's programs was \$529,999.
- Federal and state government subsidized certain programs with operating grants and contributions totaling \$1,730,857.
- The net cost of governmental activities was financed with \$3,754,327 in property tax, \$463,478 in statewide sales, services and use tax, \$2,301,612 in unrestricted state grants, \$82,001 in unrestricted investment earnings, and \$55,705 in other general revenue.

Business type Activities

The District's only business type activity is the School Nutrition Fund. Revenues of the District's business type activities totaled \$421,188 and expense totaled \$414,965 at June 30, 2010. Revenues of these activities were comprised of charges for services, federal and state reimbursements and investment income.

INDIVIDUAL FUND ANALYSIS

As previously noted, the Maquoketa Valley Community School District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

The financial performance of the District as a whole is reflected in its governmental funds. As the District completed the year, its governmental funds reported combined fund balances of \$3,474,832, above last year's ending fund balances of \$3,101,826. However the primary reason for the increase in combined fund balances can be attributed to the increase in fund balance of the Capital Projects Fund.

Governmental Fund Highlights

- The District's improving General Fund financial position is the result of many factors. Although both revenues and expenditures for the General Fund decreased during the year, the overall fund balance for the General Fund was still able to improve. As compared to fiscal 2009, revenues decreased \$340,948 and expenditures decreased \$359,819, resulting in a gain of General Fund balance of 0.57%.
- The Capital Projects fund balance increased from \$736,174 at June 30, 2009 to \$933,367 at June 30, 2010. As compared to the previous year, statewide sales, services and tax revenues remained steady while the fund experienced a \$173,970 decrease in expenditures. The transfer from the Capital Projects Fund to the Debt Service Fund for the District's general obligation bond payment was also reduced as compared to the prior year. These two factors led to the increase in Capital Projects Fund balance.

Proprietary Fund Highlights

- School Nutrition Fund net assets increased from \$153,407 at June 30, 2009 to \$159,630 at June 30, 2010, representing an increase of 4.06%. Operating grants, contributions and restricted interest increased by \$17,400 and expenditures decreased by \$4,334, thus ensuring the gain in fund balance for the Nutrition Fund.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

The District's revenues were \$535,344 less than budgeted revenues, a variance of 5.42%. The most significant variance resulted from the District receiving less in state sources than originally anticipated.

Total expenditures were less than budgeted, due primarily to the District's budget for the General Fund. It is the District's practice to budget expenditures at the maximum authorized spending authority for the General Fund. The District then manages or controls General Fund spending through its line-item budget. As a result, the District's certified budget should always exceed actual expenditures for the year.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At June 30, 2010, the District had invested \$8,841,198, net of accumulated depreciation, in a broad range of capital assets, including land, buildings, athletic facilities, computers, audio-visual equipment and transportation equipment. (See figure A-6) There is more detailed information about the District's capital assets is presented in Note 5 to the financial statements. Depreciation expense for the year was \$353,727.

The original cost of the District's capital assets was \$13,589,637. Governmental funds account for \$13,316,785, with the remainder of \$272,852 accounted for in the Proprietary School Nutrition Fund.

The largest percentage change in capital asset activity during the year occurred in the land improvements category. The District's land improvements totaled \$467,371 at June 30, 2009, compared to \$447,034 reported at June 30, 2010. The decrease in the land improvements category is the result of depreciation expense taken during the year.

Long-Term Debt

At June 30, 2010, the District had \$4,622,947 in general obligation and early retirement debt outstanding. This represents a decrease of 11.11% from last year's balance of \$5,200,999. (See Figure A-7) There is more detailed information about the District's long-term liabilities is available in Note 6 to the financial statements.

The District had outstanding general obligation bonds of \$4,090,000 at June 30, 2010.

The District had an outstanding early retirement payable from the Special Revenue, Management Levy Fund totaling \$532,947 at June 30, 2010.

ECONOMIC FACTORS BEARING ON THE DISTRICT'S FUTURE

At the time these financial statements were prepared and audited, the District was aware of several existing circumstances that could significantly affect its financial health in the future:

- State budget cuts continue to be a concern for the District, shifting the majority of funding on property taxes.
- The District experienced a decrease in certified enrollment and a steady decline is expected in the future.
- Economic development within the District does not attract businesses that would significantly increase the assessed valuation, which shifts the funding to property taxes.
- Statewide sales and service tax collections have allowed the district to pay a portion of the bonded indebtedness, thus reducing the amount of taxes levied in the Debt Service fund.
- The increases in utility and transportation costs are still a concern.

(1) **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

The Maquoketa Valley Community School District is a political subdivision of the State of Iowa and operates public schools for children in grades kindergarten through twelve, special education and pre-kindergarten. Additionally, the district either operates or sponsors various adult education programs. These courses include remedial education as well as vocational and recreational courses. The geographic area served includes the cities of Delhi, Earlville and Hopkinton, Iowa, and the predominate agricultural territory in Delaware county. The district is governed by a Board of Education whose members are elected on a non-partisan basis.

The District's financial statements are prepared in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

A. Reporting Entity

For financial reporting purposes, Maquoketa Valley Community School District has included all funds, organizations, agencies, boards, commissions and authorities. The District has also considered all potential component units for which it is financially accountable, and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the District are such that exclusion would cause the District's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability. These criteria include appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body, and (1) the ability of the District to impose its will on that organization or (2) the potential for the organization to provide specific benefits to, or impose specific financial burdens on the District. The Maquoketa Valley Community School District has no component units which meet the Governmental Accounting Standards Board criteria.

Jointly Governed Organizations - The District participates in a jointly governed organization that provides services to the District but do not meet the criteria of a joint venture since there is no ongoing financial interest or responsibility by the participating governments. The District is a member of the Delaware County Assessors' Conference Board.

B. Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements - The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the District. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by tax and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The Statement of Net Assets presents the District's nonfiduciary assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Net assets are reported in three categories:

Invested in capital assets, net of related debt consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by outstanding balances for bonds, notes, and other debt that are attributed to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Restricted net assets result when constraints placed on net assets use are either externally imposed or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted net asset consist of net assets that do not meet the definition of the two preceding categories. Unrestricted net assets often have constraints on resources that are imposed by management, but can be removed or modified.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that clearly identifiable with a specific function. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function and 2) grants, contributions and interest that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function. Property tax and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements - Separate financial statements are provided for governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the Government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as other nonmajor governmental funds.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenses, including instructional, support and other costs.

The Capital Projects Fund is utilized to account for all resources used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities, with the exception of those that are financed through enterprise funds.

The District reports the following proprietary fund:

The District's proprietary fund is the Enterprise, School Nutrition Fund. The School Nutrition Fund is used to account for the food service operations of the District.

The District also reports fiduciary funds which focus on net assets and changes in net assets. The District's fiduciary funds include the following:

The Private Purpose Trust Fund is used to account for assets held by the District under trust agreements which require income earned to be used to benefit individuals through scholarship awards.

C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The government-wide, proprietary and fiduciary fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property tax is recognized as revenue in the year for which it is levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been satisfied.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days after year end.

Property tax, intergovernmental revenues (shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments) and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the District.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, principal and interest on long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences are recognized as expenditures only when payment is due. Capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Under terms of grant agreements, the District funds certain programs by a combination of specific cost-reimbursement grants and general revenues. Thus, when program expenses are incurred, there are both restricted and unrestricted net assets available to finance the program. It is the District's policy to first apply cost-reimbursement grant resources to such programs, and then general revenues.

The proprietary fund of the District applies all applicable GASB pronouncements as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless these pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedure.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the District's enterprise fund is charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for enterprise funds include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

The District maintains its financial records on the cash basis. The financial statements of the District are prepared by making memorandum adjusting entries to the cash basis financial records.

D. Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances

The following accounting policies are followed in preparing the financial statements:

Cash, Pooled Investments and Cash Equivalents - The cash balances of most District funds are pooled and invested. Investments are stated at fair value.

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, all short-term cash investments that are highly liquid are considered to be cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and, at the day of purchase, they have a maturity date no longer than three months.

Property Tax Receivable - Property tax in the governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Property tax receivable is recognized in these funds on the levy or lien date, which is the date that the tax asking is certified by the Board of Education. Delinquent property tax receivable represents unpaid taxes for the current and prior years. The succeeding year property tax receivable represents taxes certified by the Board of Education to be collected in the next fiscal year for the purposes set out in the budget for the next fiscal year. By statute, the District is required to certify its budget in April of each year for the subsequent fiscal year. However, by statute, the tax asking and budget certification for the following fiscal year becomes effective on the first day of that year. Although the succeeding year property tax receivable has been recorded, the related revenue is deferred in both the Government-wide and fund financial statements and will not be recognized as revenue until the year for which it is levied.

Property tax revenue recognized in these funds become due and collectible in September and March of the fiscal year with a 1½% per month penalty for delinquent payments; is based on January 1, 2008 assessed property valuations; is for the tax accrual period July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010 and reflects the tax asking contained in the budget certified to the County Board of Supervisors in April, 2009.

Due from Other Governments - Due from other governments represents amounts due from the State of Iowa, various shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments.

Inventories - Inventories are valued at cost using the first-in, first-out method for purchased items and government commodities. Inventories of proprietary funds are recorded as expenses when consumed rather than when purchased or received.

Capital Assets - Capital assets, which include property, machinery and equipment and intangibles, are reported in the applicable governmental or business type activities columns in the Government-wide statement of net assets. Capital assets are recorded at historical cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend asset lives are not capitalized. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost in excess of the following thresholds and estimated useful lives in excess of two years.

Salaries and Benefits Payable - Payroll and related expenditures for annual contracts corresponding to the current school year, which is payable in July and August, have been accrued as liabilities.

Deferred Revenue - Although certain revenues are measurable, they are not available. Available means collected within the current period or expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Deferred revenue in the governmental fund financial statements represent the amount of assets that have been recognized, but the related revenue has not been recognized since the assets are not collected within the current period or expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used

to pay liabilities of the current period. Deferred revenue consists of unspent grant proceeds as well as property tax receivables and other receivables not collected within sixty days after year end.

Deferred revenue on the statement of net assets consists of succeeding year property tax receivable that will not be recognized as revenue until the year for which it is levied.

Unearned Revenue - Unearned revenues in the School Nutrition Fund are monies collected for lunches that have not yet been served. The lunch account balances will either be reimbursed or served lunches. The revenue will be considered earned when services are provided. The lunch account balances are reflected on the Statement of Net Assets in the Proprietary Funds.

Long-term Liabilities - In the Government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the governmental activities column in the Statement of Net Assets.

Fund Balances - In the governmental fund financial statements, reservations of fund balance are reported for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose.

Restricted Net Assets - In the government-wide Statement of Net Assets, net assets are reported as restricted when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or laws and regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

E. Budgeting and Budgetary Control

The budgetary comparison and related disclosures are reported as Required Supplementary Information.

(2) **Cash and Pooled Investments**

The District's deposits in bank at June 30, 2010 were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by the State Sinking Fund in accordance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa. This chapter provides for additional assessments against the depositories to insure there will be no loss of public funds.

The District is authorized by statute to invest public funds in obligations of the United States government, its agencies and instrumentalities; certificates of deposit or other evidences of deposit at federally insured depository institutions approved by the Board of Education prime eligible bankers acceptances; certain high rated commercial paper; perfected repurchase agreements; certain registered open-end management investment companies; certain joint investment trusts; and warrants or improvement certificates of a drainage district. As of the year ended June 30, 2010, the District had no investments.

Early Retirement

The District offers a voluntary early retirement plan to its certified employees. Eligible employees must be at least age fifty-five and employees must have completed fifteen years of continuous service to the District. The employee must have worked an average of twenty-five or more hours per week and

during the last 15 years the employee has worked at least thirty-six weeks per year. Employees must complete an application which is required to be approved by the Board of Education. The early retirement incentive for each eligible employee is equal to 35% of the employee's base salary calculated by using the current year regular salary schedule, less any other additional pay. The District paid \$161,017 in early retirement benefits during the year ended June 30, 2010.

(7) Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

The District implemented GASB Statement No.45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits other Than Pensions during the year ended June 30, 2010.

Plan Description - The District operates a single-employer retiree benefit plan which provides medical/prescription drug and dental benefits for retirees and their spouses. There are 78 active and 21 retired members in the plan. Employees must be age 59 or older at retirement and have fifteen or more years of continuous service to the District.

The medical/prescription drug benefit, which is a self-funded medical plan, is administered by Wellmark. Retirees under age 65 pay the same premium for the medical/prescription drug benefit as active employees, which results in an implicit subsidy and an OPEB liability.

Funding Policy - the contribution requirements of plan members are established and may be amended by the District. The District currently finances the retiree benefit plan on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation - The District's annual OPEB cost is calculated based on the annual required contribution of the District (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with GASB Statement No. 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities over a period not to exceed 30 years.

The end of the year net OPEB obligation was calculated by the actuary as the cumulative difference between the actuarially determined funding requirements and the plans actual contributions for the year ended June 30, 2010.

Funded Status and Funding Progress - As of July 1, 2009, the most recent actuarial valuation date for the period July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010, the actuarial accrued liability was \$1.576 million, with no actuarial value of assets, resulting in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) of \$1.576 million. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was \$3.594 million, and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 43.9%. As of June 30, 2010, there were no trust fund assets.

Actuarial Methods and Assumptions - Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality and the healthcare cost trend. Actuarially determined amounts are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress presented as required supplementary information in the section following the Notes to the Financial Statements, will present multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

As of July 1, 2009 actuarial valuation date, the projected unit credit cost method was used. The actuarial assumptions include a 4.5% discount rate based on the District's funding policy. The projected annual medical trend rate is 11%. The ultimate medical trend rate is 5%. The medical trend rate is reduced 0.5% each year until reaching the 5% ultimate trend rate.

Mortality rates are from the RP2000 Group Annuity Mortality Table, applied on a gender-specific basis. Annual retirement assumptions were developed using information provided by the District.

Projected claim costs of the medical plan are \$614 per month for retirees less than age 65. The salary increase rate was assumed to be 3.5% per year. The UAAL is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll expense on an open basis over 30 years.

(8) Pension and Retirement Benefits

The District contributes to the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) which is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Iowa. IPERS provides retirement and death benefits which are established by State statute to plan members and beneficiaries. IPERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. The report may be obtained by writing to IPERS, P.O. Box 9117, Des Moines, Iowa, 50306-9117.

Plan members are required to contribute 4.30% of their annual covered salary and the District is required to contribute 6.65% of annual covered salary. Contribution requirements are established by State statute. The District's contribution to IPERS for the years ended June 30, 2010, 2009, and 2008 were \$290,388, \$295,252, and \$274,686, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

(9) Risk Management

Maquoketa Valley Community School District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft; damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by the purchase of commercial insurance. The District assumes liability for any deductibles and claims in excess of coverage limitations. Settled claims from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

(11) Area Education Agency

The District is required by the Code of Iowa to budget for its share of special education support, media and educational services provided through the area education agency. The District's actual amount for this purpose totaled \$321,665 for the year ended June 30, 2010 and is recorded in the General Fund by making a memorandum adjusting entry to the cash basis financial statements.

This budgetary comparison is presented as Required Supplementary Information in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standard Board Statement No. 41 for governments with significant budgetary perspective differences resulting from not being able to present budgetary comparisons for the General Fund and each major Special Revenue Fund.

In accordance with the Code of Iowa, the Board of Education annually adopts a budget following required public notice and hearing for all funds except Private-Purpose Trust and Agency Funds. The budget may be amended during the year utilizing similar statutorily prescribed procedures. The District's budget is prepared on the GAAP basis.

Formal and legal budgetary control for the certified budget is based upon four major classes of expenditures known as functions not by fund or fund type. These four functions are instruction, support services, non-instructional programs and other expenditures. Although the budget document presents function expenditures or expenses by fund, the legal level of control is at the aggregated functional level, not by fund. The Code of Iowa also provides that District expenditures in the General Fund may not exceed the amount authorized by the school finance formula.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Maquoketa Valley Community School District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the effectiveness of Maquoketa Valley Community School District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Maquoketa Valley Community School District's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and therefore, there can be no assurance all deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting we consider to be material weaknesses and other deficiencies we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of the control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatement on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility a material misstatement of the District's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiency in internal control described in Part II of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item II-A-10 to be a material weakness.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency or combination of deficiencies in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the deficiency described in Part II of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item II-B-10 to be significant deficiency.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Maquoketa Valley Community School District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, non-compliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards. However, we noted certain immaterial instances of non-compliance or other matters that are described in Part IV of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.

Comments involving statutory and other legal matters about the District's operations for the year ended June 30, 2010 are based exclusively on knowledge obtained from procedures performed during our audit of the financial statements of the District. Since our audit was based on tests and samples, not all transactions that might have had an impact on the comments were necessarily audited. The comments involving statutory and other legal matters are not intended to constitute legal interpretations of those statutes.

Maquoketa Valley Community School District's responses to findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. While we have expressed our conclusions on the District's responses, we did not audit Maquoketa Valley Community School District's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

Gift cards as incentives do not appear to meet public purpose as defined in the Attorney General's opinion dated April 25, 1979.

Recommendation -The District should review the procedures in place, and make necessary adjustments to comply.

Response - The District will continue to educate staff and Activity sponsors that purchasing gift cards to give as incentives is not acceptable.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-C-10 Travel Expense - No expenditures of District money for travel expenses of spouses of District officials or employees were noted. No travel advances to District officials or employees were noted.

- IV-G-10 Certified Enrollment - We noted no variances in the basic enrollment data certified to the Department of Education.
- IV-H-10 Supplementary Weighting - No variances in the basic enrollment data certified to the Iowa Department of Education were noted.
- IV-I-10 Deposits and Investments - We noted no instances of non-compliance with the deposit and investment provisions of Chapter 12B and Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa and the District's investment policy.
- IV-J-10 Certified Annual Report - The Certified Annual Report was filed with the Department of Education timely and we noted no significant deficiencies in the amounts reported.
- IV-K-10 Categorical Funding - No instances were noted of categorical funding used to supplant rather than supplement other funds.
- IV-L-10 Statewide Sales, Services and Use Tax - During our audit, there was no instances of non-compliance noted with the use of the statewide sales, services and use tax revenue provisions in Chapter 423F.3 of the Code of Iowa.

IV-M-10 Financial Condition - At June 30, 2010, the District also had three individual Student Activity Fund accounts with deficits totaling \$3,599.

Recommendation - The District should continue to monitor these funds and investigate alternatives to eliminate the deficits.

Response - The District will monitor Student Activity accounts and inquire of sponsors of how the deficits will be eliminated.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-N-10 Officiating Contracts - We noted during our audit that the Board President was not signing athletic officiating contracts for the District.

Recommendation - The District should have the Board President signing all contracts the District enters into, to comply with Chapter 291.1 of the Code of Iowa.

Response - The Board President will sign all athletic officiating contracts for the District.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-O-10 District and Regional Rents - We noted during our audit that the District receives money for use of facilities when hosting district and regional events. Currently the District's practice is to receipt rents for hosting district and regional events into the Activity Fund.

Recommendation - Chapter 297.9 of the Code of Iowa requires rent to be receipted into the General Fund. In the future, the District should receipt rent collected for facility usage into the General Fund.

Response - Rents for the use of District facilities will be receipted into the General Fund.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

IV-P-10 Student Activity Fund - In accordance with 298A.8 of the Code of Iowa and Iowa Administrative Code 281-12.6(1), the purpose of the Student Activity Fund is to account for financial transactions related to the cocurricular and extracurricular activities offered as a part of the education program for students. Specific examples of questioned items and recommendations are as follows:

Commissions: We noted during our audit that Lifetouch picture commissions were being receipted into the Student Activity Fund

Recommendation - The General Fund is the only allowable fund for commission revenue recognition. In the future, Lifetouch picture commissions should be receipted to the General Fund.

Response - Lifetouch picture commissions will be receipted into the General Fund.

Conclusion - Response accepted.

Box Tops Donations: We noted during our audit that Box Tops donations are being receipted into the Student Activity Fund.

Recommendation - Donations given to a school should be expended according to donor request. According to information contained on the website for Box Tops, the donation can be used for items such as books, computers or playground equipment. Since the items listed for purchase with Box Top donations appear more instructional in nature, the most logical place to record these donations would be the General Fund.

Response - Box Top donations will be receipted into the General Fund.

Conclusion - Response accepted.
